 A FEW CENTENNIAL ITEMS.

[From the Boston Journal of Commerce.]
 Johnson & Clark, proprietors of The New Home, are accorded the credit of presenting their wares in the handsomest pavilion in the whole Exposition. The architects were Messrs. Hartnell & Swasey, of this city (Philadelphia). Building and furnishing by the well-known firm of Bancroft & Boyden. Style of architecture known as the mediaval. The material of the building is constructed in black walnut. It is 16 feet square by 25 feet extreme height. From the floor springs a beautiful balustrade, enclosing the space occupied. On this are the words, "New Home Sewing Machine," in gold letters. Running up from the balustrade and supporting the frieze and superstructure are 12 massive columns, relieved in gold and ornaments dividing each side into three equal spaces, the central one forming entrances, the others draped and having the appearance of open windows. From the frieze of the roof slopes towards the centre, on each side meeting an elegant band of rich carved work, from which springs a dome, encircled at the top by a richly designed cornice. On the summit of the dome is an elegantly carved figure, five feet in height, representing Peace with outstretched arms, holding a laurel branch. The interior of the edifice is in keeping with the exterior, arranged as an elegant drawing room. The slope of the roof above is of plate glass, giving free access to the light. From the centre of the dome suspends an elegant chandelier. The floor is covered with rich carpet. The cost of the building and furnishing was nearly \$5,000. So much for the casket; now for the contents. Fifteen years ago the gentlemen comprising the firm of Johnson, Clark & Co., realizing the important position sewing machines must occupy, determined on commencing the manufacture of the "Home Shuttle," which has achieved an honorable name, and their late improved machine has met with an unprecedented sale in every part of the world.
