Hood River, Wasco county, has elements of beauty that we have seen nowhere else on our coast of unwritten beauties. In climate it is the happy mean between that west of the Cascade mountains and that east of them. Its adaptations are not to extensive farming, but rather to small fruit farms. Occupied thus it is large enough to constitute a county, and would give most delightful homes to the people. As a summer resort we are not acquainted with its equal. With an atmosphere tempered by the not distant snowy mountains and the cool, clear Columbia, with water bursting from springs as pure as crystal snows, with streams filled with "speckled beauties" and not far away vast forests of game, it would be hard to conceive a place that gives more conditions necessary for such a resort than are offered by this great natural park.—*Advocate.*
