Words marked (Obs.) in the dictionary will not be admitted.  
Only the singular, nominative of nouns; the infinitive form of the verb, without the word "to"; and the positive of adjectives, will be admitted.

The Chicago *News*, in its commercial article, notes the discrepancy between the government statistician's estimate of the wheat crop of Oregon and that of western wheat growers and buyers and eastern elevator men. The former estimate is 8,071,000 bushels for Washington, and 12,000,000 bushels for Oregon. All western authorities agree upon 40,000,000 to 42,000,000 bushels, and Minneapolis shippers who have carried wheat eastwardly from this state confirm the latter figures. The discrepancy between these estimates is too large to be accounted for only on the supposition that somebody is grossly exaggerating the facts. The published detail reports show a larger yield per acre than ever before, with an increased average, which give strong probabilities to the local statements. The *News* mentioned another important feature connected with the Pacific coast wheat trades: When the flour from this wheat first reached here Inspector Rathbone condemned it because of its alkali taste. Since then the brokers have discovered that the alkali taste disappeared in the baking, and that the flour had peculiar qualities which made it very desirable for baking. Still another point is that the Michigan millers have discovered that the Pacific coast is a counterpart of their own, and are buying it freely. This is a valuable tribute to the northwest, which has been won against the strong prejudices of Chicago and Minneapolis. The grain of this coast will meet an increasing demand as its superior value becomes established.—*West Coast Trade.*
