Multnomah County Ballot Measures

Ballot Measure #3. This ballot measure would authorize a \$3 million annual levy for three years to restore library services and avoid further curtailments.

Ballot Measure #4. This ballot measure would establish a county library commission. The public library system is now primarily funded by the county but managed by a private organization known as The Library Association of Portland. This measure would create a public county agency administered by a commission appointed by the Multnomah County Commission.

Ballot Measure #5. This measure is a request for more than \$15 million "to address the problem of overcrowding in county correctional facilties." \$12 million is earmarked for facilities and diversionary programs.
