Northwest Repertory Company premiere's Richard Wiltshire's play, Duesenberg, winner of their 1984 playwriting contest.

Duesenberg represents a dynamic force in original playwriting. As Portland theatre continues to grow in both popularity and critical acclaim, the staging of original dramas fosters the development of local playwrights and helps establish Portland as a hub of creative talent, not just here at home, but throughout the country.

Richard Wiltshire blends subtle, ironic humor with gripping drama to tell his story, and director William Burger elicits sensitive, unforgettable performances from his versatile cast. All combined, Duesenberg is a pivotal event that should not be missed.

Duesenberg focuses on the theme of giving—both honestly and dishonestly and its consequences. It is the story of a Jewish family whose wealth has delivered them from Poland and the Holocaust, but not from the feeligs of guilt and betrayal that surface when a young thief enters their lives. Like pieces in a chess game, each character moves independently yet ultimately their destinies are intertwined.

Duesenberg will play Fridays, Saturdays, and Sundays through August 26.
