

As part of their month-long program, Interaction Art and Science, Northwest Artists Workshop and The Oregon Museum of Science and Industry will present a week-long sound installation by California artist Bruce Fier. The installation will be at Northwest Artists Workshop October 8-12, in the Main Gallery.

Fier's piece will consist of a network of tubes suspended form the gallery ceiling, in a tree-like formation. As the tubes respond to the ambient environmental noises, the column of air in each one resonates to its particular frequency. Gallery visitors are invited to experiment with making sounds in the gallery, and put their ears to the tubes to hear the consequent changes in sound.

A show of *Photographs* by Linda Bellon of Los Angeles will open at the same time in the East Gallery at NWAW, and run through November 4. The show, entitled *Medical Absurdities*, is a group of color photographs which depict bodies in pseudo-medical settings. The photographs function as allegorical statements about the loss of control people experience in a complex society. Humorous and somewhat macabre settings are used to point out real problems with the medical profession, the political and economic institutions upon which we are dependent, and our existential plight.

An opening reception for both shows will be held Monday, October 8, from 5:30 until 8:30 p.m. The event is free and open to the public.
