For four years the Hester Street
Klezmer Band has been recreating the
uniquely joyous spirit of klezmer music in
the streets, parks and performance
spaces of Portland and the Pacific Northwest. The band announces the first concert in its third annual summer series
sponsored by the Metropolitan Arts Commission and the Portland Folklore Society.

Klezmer music is a style that developed over the centuries in Jewish communities in Eastern Europe. The music combined elements of Gypsy, Rumanian, Greek, Middle Eastern as well as Yiddish music and it was constantly changing as Jewish musicians came into contact with new kinds of music (ranging from military music to light classics). When Jews migrated to America en masse at the end of the nineteenth century they brought their klezmer music with them and it continued to change as it mixed with the jazz, blues, vaudeville and Dixieland that abounded on the streets of New York. Klezmer music has been called Yiddish

jazz and in fact it had a great influence on many jazz musicians in the twenties and thirties — many of them Jewish themselves — such as Benny Goodman and Artie Shaw.
