scope. He has addressed such divers issues as gay rights and the struggles of the Nicaraguan people, in musical styles ranging from folk to rock to regade. Murphy and Sieber's 1984 release, Canticles of Light, blended jazz and folk chants with a traditional gospel idiom to create a sound that provides hope for troubled times.

Fierce Love marks their entry into an all-out full band sound. Leaving the easy familiarity of the folk genre behind, Murphy has written a large and varied body of new material that retains all the honesty of his past work while providing a strong, contemporary base. A polyrhythmic blend of instruments with Charlie Murphy on auitar, Jami Sieber on electric cello, Stephanie Osso on the synthesizer, Arturo Pale on bass, and Steve Jones on percussion, backs up the force of lyrical poetry to create music that moves feet and hearts. Together they prove that it is possible to merge a driving, danceable beat with lyrics that speak eloquently about concerns of the day.
