LECTURES

The Media PROJECT & the P.S.U. Women's Studies Program are sponsoring a 3-part lecture series, free and open to the public, entitled Cutting Through History: A Woman's Place is in the Editing Room. In examining why women are so frequently on the editing bench and so rarely in the director's chair, Cutting Through History will focus on the work of early Soviet filmmaker/editor Esther Shub, who taught the art of montage to Eisenstein and other contemporaries. The series will feature films, slide-shows and open discussions. Participants will include: Professor Lena Lencek, specialist on Soviet culture and women in the visual arts; filmmaker and film historian Christopher Ley; feminist and Soviet film researcher Eve Sicular; and Oregon Historical Society film archivist Michele Kribs. All lectures will take place in 75 Lincoln Hall at PSU at 7:30 p.m.

Esther Shub and the Birth of Soviet
Cinema, Tuesday, Sept. 10. Topics: The
early Soviet film scene; women's roles in
art and politics after the Russian Revolution; women and editing in the US and the
USSR. Included is an early experimental
Soviet newsreel.

Images Recycled: Shub's Fall of the Romanov Dynasty (1927). To be shown twice with introduction, Wednesday, Sept. 11 & Thursday, Sept. 12. The world's first full-length compilation film.

The Hand That Edits The Movie, Wednesday, Sept. 18. Topics: Ideology, ethics and techniques in film and television editing; the use of archival footage as 'film truth'; women as editors inside and outside Hollywood, from Dorothy Arzner to Dede Allen.
