The Charter came into force on 24 October 1945, when China, France, the USSR, the United Kingdom and the United States and a majority of the other signatories had filed their instruments of ratification.

On 31 October 1947, the General Assembly decided that 24 October, the anniversary of the entry into force of the Charter of the United Nations, should thenceforth be officially called "United Nations Day" and be devoted to informing the peoples of the world of the aims and achievements of the Organization and to obtaining support for its work.
