March 8 is International Women's Day. Women in Portland will celebrate with a multicultural festival at the Pine Street Theater, 9th and SE Pine, on Saturday from 10 to 5 pm. A \$2.00 admission is charged, childcare is provided, and the Pine Street Theater is wheelchair accessible.

The Pine Street Theater will be transformed into an eclectic blend of women's culture. Stages will be set up featuring musicians, poets, and speakers. The mainstage will feature Motherlode, Susan Arrow and the Quivers, the Portland Women's Jug Band and other musicians throughout the day. Another stage will cater to poetry and ballad enthusiasts with poetry readings by Judith Barrington, Kathleen Reyes, Barbara Diamond and others. Mary Benson will be performing songs from England and Ireland with other local vocalists alternating poetry and song through the course of the festival.

Craftspeople, food booths and organizations also highlight the day's events. The Northwest Big Mountain Support Group will be there alongside A Woman's Place Bookstore, the National Organization for Women, the Portland Women's Feminist Health Center and others. Craftspeople will display wares ranging from pottery to paintings, baskets to masks, and since Portlanders are food-loving people, food booths will entice participants with ethnic cuisine.

The Women's International League for Peace and Freedom will wrap up the day's festivities with a political forum led by Kathleen Saadot, entitled "Women in the Budget." The forum will deal with the issue of redirecting the military budget into programs that would benefit women

and their families. The forum will focus on issues of housing, health, education, international relations and special programs.
