Take Back The Night is an annual protest against rape, wife-beating, pornography, and other forms of violence against women and children. The first

Take Back the Night March was held on May Eve, 1977 in Frankfurt, Germany, when 3000 women marched to protest violence against women. The first such protest in the United States was held the next year in San Francisco when 5000 women marched to protest pornography. Since then, the event has spread to cities throughout the United States and has been an annual event in Portland for the last several years.
