Northwest Artists Workshop is happy to announce the Mobius Performing Group from Boston will appear in Portland as part of their spring tour of the Pacific Northwest. On May 2 and 3, at 8:00 p.m., Mobius will present Persephone and Hades at the Northwest Artists Workshop. Tickets are \$5.00 general and \$4.00 for NWAW members.

Persephone and Hades is based on the myth of Persephone's yearly descent to the Underworld. This audience-interactive performance, presented annually by the Mobius Group since 1980, explores concepts of time and issues of power between women and men, audience and performers. It is performed in a slow, reflective style, creating a dreamlike sense of eternal time. The theme of the use of power is further explored in the experience of the audience, as they direct the actions of Persephone and determine the length of the evening.

In Persephone and Hades, as with many of Mobius Performing Group pieces, the performance is structured and shaped by the choices and wishes of the audience. Audience members do not perform in the piece, but they do have a clearly defined role, in non-verbally guiding the choices made by the performers, the degree of their interaction, and even the length of the entire performance. In this way, each performance of Persephone and Hades is a completely unique expression of the group assembled that
