ous and zany revue stars both disabled and able-bodied actors who manage through comedy to turn all the cliches concerning disabilities upside down, surprising and delighting audiences in the process. Reviews of the Chicago production called the play "Everything a good revue should be: smart, funny, sharply pointed and fast moving" and "Filled with wonderful moments, a special evening of comedy that will keep you laughing."

The IFCC's production of **Staring Back** is directed by Terry J. Nelson, and features Jim Ballantine, Patrick Bloedorn, Janine Delaunay, Jerry Dunham, Michael Foster, Ross Huffman-Kerr and Drucie Kelly. The new Storefront version includes several additions and improvements made for those productions.
