Safe Sex IS working, says CAP

To the Editor:

The Cascade AIDS Project was quoted in the last issue of *Just Out* as saying that the increasing number of diagnoses in Oregon is an indication that gay men in Oregon are not practicing safer sex. In actuality, CAP knows for a FACT that gay men in Oregon are practicing safer sex, most of the time. Multnomah County reports that cases of sexually transmitted diseases among gay men, other than AIDS, have dropped by up to 70% in the past five years.

The rising number of AIDS cases in 1986 and 1987 reflect the behavior of gay men three to five years ago. We are confident that the change from high risk behavior to low risk behavior in many gay men this year will mean that the rate of increase in diagnoses of AIDS will slow over the next five years. Over 100 people will have been diagnosed with AIDS in Oregon by the end of the summer and even with the "safer" attitude and behavior of gay men today, we can expect that the number of diagnoses of AIDS in Oregon will exceed 2,000 by 1991. The only way to stop the spread of AIDS and to prevent this impending catastrophe is for all gay men to practice safer sex all the time. And we can do it.

CAP has been running a series of safer sex workshops called "NEW ATTITUDES" since January. 94% of the participants report that they are more encouraged to practice safer sex and 100% say they would recommend "NEW ATTITUDES" to their friends. If you need the support of others and want to talk about practicing safer sex with other people come to the "NEW ATTITUDES" workshops

starting up again in September. "NEW ATTITUDES" is very non-threatening, supportive of your lifestyle and, surprisingly, a great deal of fun for the participants. Many men return again and again just to meet new people and to talk.

Gay men are not fated to get AIDS. AIDS is completely preventable. The prevention, however, is totally up to you. For more information about AIDS, CAP or our summer BIKE-FOR-LIFE, contact CAP at 223-5907.


