

Volunteers: CAP needs you!

August is Volunteer Recruitment Month at the Cascade AIDS Project where the need for volunteers has increased threefold in the past year.

"To continue to adequately address the AIDS crisis in Portland, we need people, not just money," says Brown McDonald, CAP director. "Paid staff cannot perform all the functions that volunteers are doing."

Cascade AIDS Project faces a critical period in its effort to provide quality support and educational services. The award-winning PAL (Personal Active Listener) Project will need to train at least forty new PALS in September to meet the needs of Portland's PWAs and PWARCs. Also critical is a lack of regularly scheduled office volunteer staff.

"We need whatever amount of time a person can spare," says volunteer office manager Jim Michaels. "A half-day a week in the office, serving on a committee or fundraiser, management of a whole new program are a few of the things people can volunteer for."

Many people are capable of helping with filing, deliveries, copying while other needs require skills such as typing, data processing, video technology, writing and design. Also needed are speakers, fundraisers, educators, and those with management skills.

Present volunteers represent a wide spectrum of the population: lesbians, gay men, heterosexuals, AIDS and ARC patients, mothers, professionals, students, and many more.

Says volunteer Greg, "Now I feel that I'm finally doing something that makes a difference."

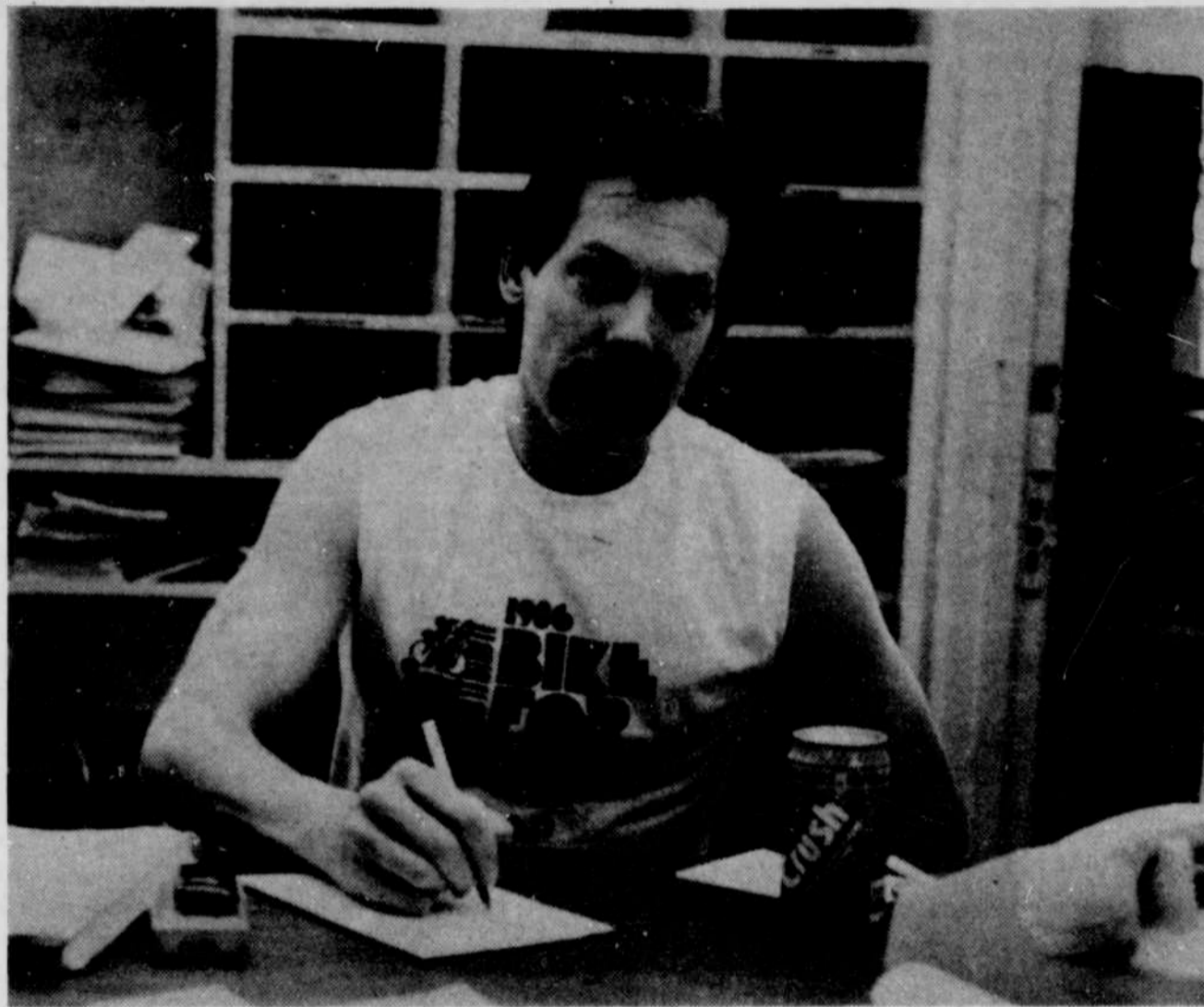
"I'm still finding my niche," says Eddie Hickey, speaker trainee. "I started as an office volunteer and took it from there."

Clinic protestors fined

Six anti-abortion protestors were held in civil contempt for violations of an injunction prohibiting certain actions at the Portland Feminist Women's Health Center.

U.S. District Court Judge Helen Frye ruled that the protestors, including Priscilla Martin, were found to have violated the court order by yelling and singing which interfered with Center services, by obstructing of clients' ac-

cess into the clinic and by demonstrating within the 25-foot zone around the clinic entrance.

Each violator was fined \$500. The Center was awarded \$1250 in costs since the injunction was imposed in April, and attorneys' fees.

Scholarship funds available

According to owner-manager Lanny Swerdlow, "There will be no increase in our standard cover charge with the addition of the Hollyrock Lounge dance area.
