Oregon NOW sponsors The Border March For Women's Lives, in memory of Rosie Jimenez. Rosie died in 1977 from complications due to a back alley abortion. Hers was the first documented case of a woman dying from an illegal abortion afer being denied an abortion because of the Hyde Amendment — the amendment that eliminated federal funding for abortions. The interstate action not only symbolizes the history of women traveling across borders for abortions but also will demonstrate the pro-choice movement's commitment to defeat Initiative 6 in Oregon's Novemer election. If the initiative passes it will eliminte Oregon's state funded abortions for rape, incest victims, and low-income women.

Oregon and Washington supporters will meet at 11:30 a.m. on the Oregon side of the I-5 Bridge at the P.U.C. Information Center, and march across the bridge to Vancouver, Washington. A rally will take place directly following the march, and will feature regional and national speakers.
