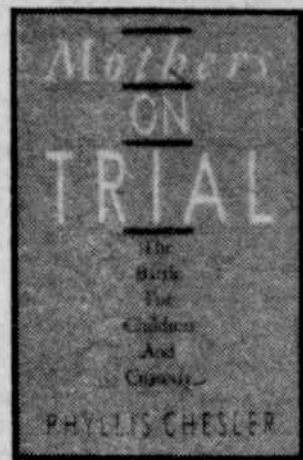


BOOK BRIEFS

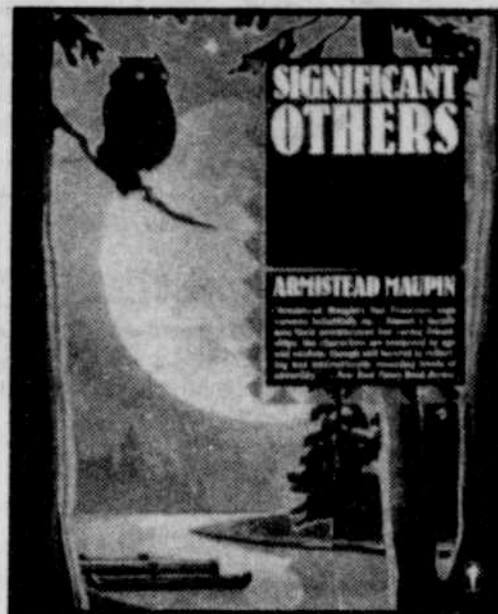

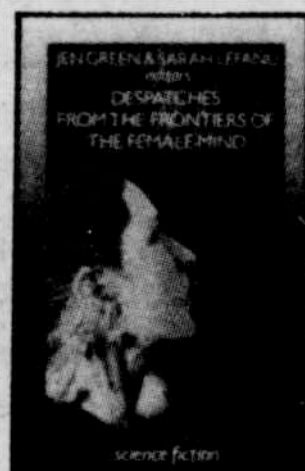

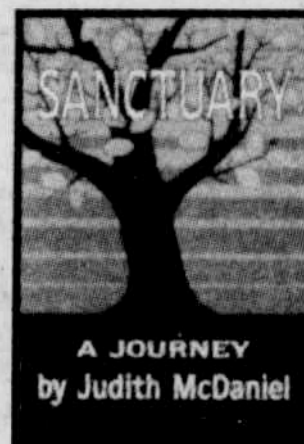


DESPATCHES FROM THE FRONTIERS OF THE FEMALE MIND
