TIME TO CELEBRATE. The Portland City Council has taken one more step toward the enactment of civil rights for all persons. They just passed a resolution that gives unmarried domestic partners health benefits comparable to those of married employees. Bill Casey, founder of the Oregon chapter of the Traditional Family Values Coalition, was in the Council chambers for the vote, voicing the same old sorry crap that he usually does. He called the vote a step toward fulfilling the gay agenda. Well, duh. Does he think we are *not* going to keep pushing toward our full and equal civil rights as a people?
