But her victory was incomplete: the judge prohibited her lover from moving in because 'Mrs. Mitchell and the children need to develop a firmer base of understanding, particularly regarding the homosexual issue."

# ANNIVERSARY OF

On June 13, 1989, Washington's Corcoran Gallery canceled a planned exhibit by photographer Robert Mapplethorpe. A few of the photographs to be shown depicted homoerotic or S/M activity, and conservatives, such as Senator Jesse Helms bellowed their disapproval. Mapplethorpe had died three months earlier; his career took off anyway.



pseudonym Lisa Ben (an anagram of "lesbian"), Edythe Eyde published the premier issue of Vice-Versa, the first U.S. lesbian magazine, in June of 1947. Eyde typed each issue manually, making seven carbons with each retyping, during her lunch break at RKO studios. The first issue was dedicated 'to those of us who will never quite be able to adapt ourselves to the iron-bound rules of Convention."

Ibania finally repealed its sodomy laws, yet everyday life remains rigidly controlled by the communist government. The first gay organization, the small Gay Albania Society, formed June 6, 1994.
