YOUNG ACTIVISTS VISIT OREGON

The Third Wave Foundation, a New York-based national organization for women between 15 and 30, is sending 13 young activists on a summer networking trip throughout the Pacific Northwest. Their journey, which began July 27 and will continue through Aug. 12, will take them to Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana.

The participants, ranging in age from 16 to 26, will learn about justice organizing and connect with activists in the region to build a national network of strategies for social change. Among the 40 nonprofits on their itinerary are Basic

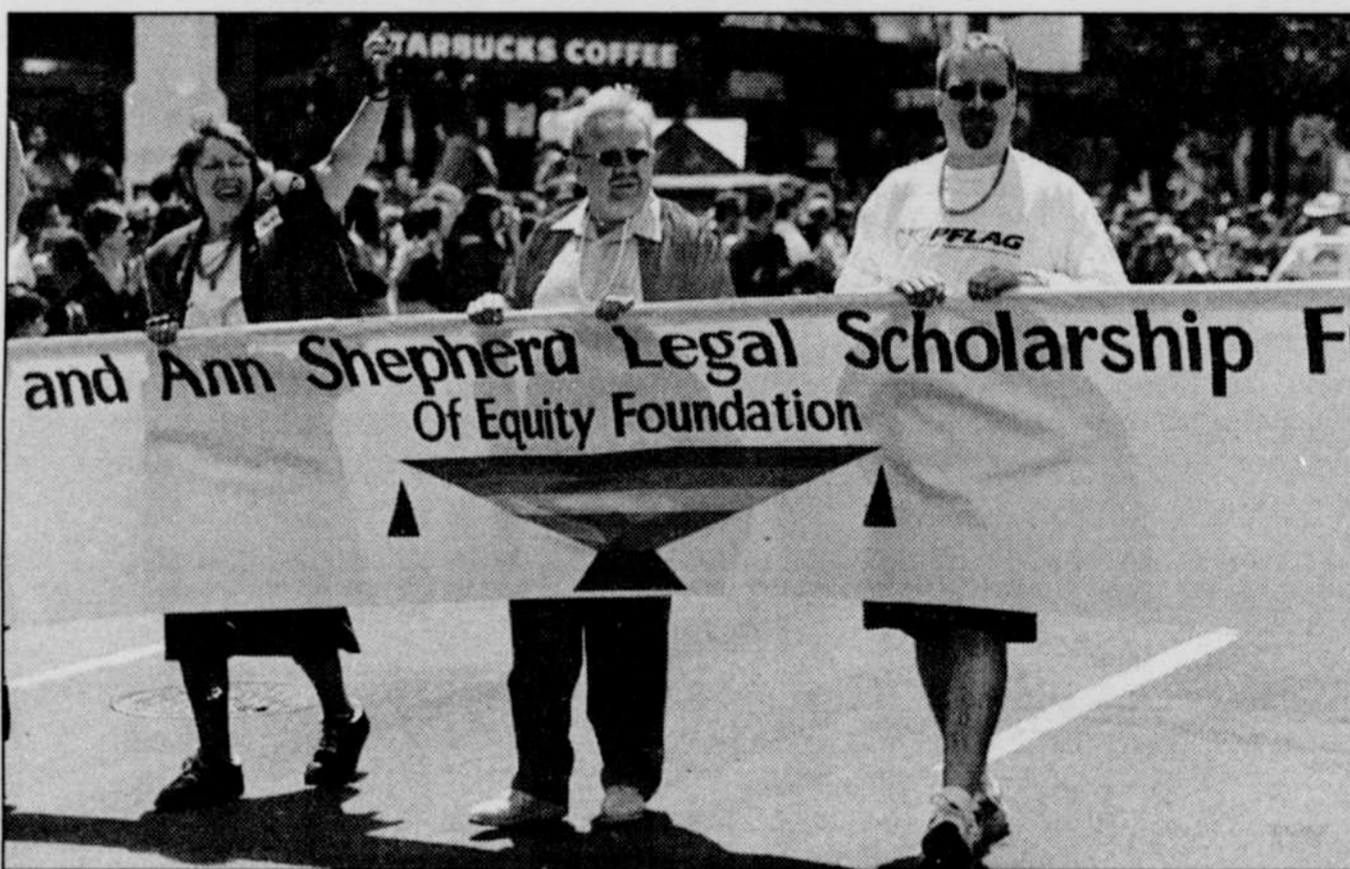
nizers said in a press release. "This speakout has been organized to provide a safe place for youth to come forward and share their experiences as well as...to break down the walls of isolation victimized youth often feel."

Organizers include Southeast Works Youth Advisory Board, Police Accountability Campaign 2002, Sisters in Action for Power, Latin America/Asia Pacific Youth Program of the American Friends Service Committee and Love Makes a Family. Spanish and Russian interpreters will be present at the event.

The Bill and Ann Shepherd Legal Scholarship Fund of Equity Foundation has announced its recipient for the 2001-2002 academic year.

Rights Oregon, the Rural Organizing Project and In Other Words Women's Books and Resources.

Reaching Out Across Movements brings attention to regions of the United States that generally are isolated from larger social change communities. The Pacific Northwest receives less than 13 percent of all foundation support nationally yet faces many unique and sizable challenges posed by a strong right-wing presence.

The activists hope the experience will help develop leadership opportunities for young women. They also will build on information learned during the first ROAMS trip last summer in the Southeast.

SOUTHEAST YOUTH SPEAK OUT AGAINST POLICE ABUSE

Several groups are coming together for a "speakout" to raise public awareness of police misconduct toward Portland youth, particularly those who are queer, poor, from immigrant families, nonwhite or homeless. The event will be held from 6:30 to 9 p.m. Aug. 15 in Room 118 at Portland Community College's Southeast Center, 2850 S.E. 82nd Ave. between Division Street and Powell Boulevard.

"In many ways, youth are the invisible victims of police harassment and violence, as they tend to be the least aware of their rights," orga-

The \$3,500 scholarship honors third-year law students dedicated to passing the Oregon State Bar Exam and donating part of their legal expertise to helping keep Oregon a hate-free state by fighting bigotry and discrimination against sexual minorities. WE ARE EVERYWHERE

Census data indicate same-sex couples are located throughout Oregon and Washington, the *Oregonian* reports July 22. In fact, of the 2,073 census tracts in the two states, only 21 reported no gay or lesbian partners.

Three of those were in Oregon: the unpopulated desert of Malheur County, remote Wallowa County and Klamath Falls. In Washington state, no same-sex couples were reported in the sparsely populated Olympic Peninsula, the area containing the state penitentiary in Walla Walla and even a few heavily populated tracts in
