ride will be busting out all over the Pacific Northwest this summer. The region's biggest event is Seattle Pride, which will be held June 26 and 27. The theme is "i-scream PRIDE!"

"The ice cream adds a lot of fun to the event—youthfulness that we can all remember from our childhood," says Melissa Holloway, Seattle Pride co-chairwoman. "In our current political climate, 'I scream' is a statement about making yourself heard, being proud of who you are and standing up for your rights as part of this world. The Seattle Pride March will run from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. June 27. It starts at the corner of Broadway and Pike and continues north on Broadway up to Volunteer Park, where all of the festival events will be held:

• Seattle Pride Festival:

11 a.m. to 6 p.m. June 26 and 27. Headliner Crystal Waters will perform from 3 to 3:30 p.m. June 27.

• Reception: noon to 7 p.m. June 26 and noon to 6 p.m. June 27 at the Seattle Asian Art Museum. Proceeds benefit Seattle Pride. Beer and wine will be served. Admission is by invitation only because of park regulations. To reserve a space call 206-324-0405 or e-mail info@seattlepride.org.


• Bingo in the Park: 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. June 26.

• Salem: Capitol Pride will be held from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. July 25 at Cascade Gateway Park. This year's celebration, "Picnic in the Park," will feature live music, a softball game, races and other activities for kids and adults, information booths, voter registration cards and a free barbecue. Capitol Pride organizers will furnish hamburgers, hot dogs, buns, condiments and chips; people are welcome to bring other items to grill and are asked to provide their own refreshments. Drugs and alcohol are prohibited. Donations to help defray the cost will be accepted but are not necessary.

• Olympia: The theme for this year's Capitol City Pride is "Best Supporting Activist: Behindthe-Scenes Stars of the Community." Gather between 11 and 11:45 a.m. June 19 at the fountain on the State Capitol campus for a parade and rally, which will march down Capitol Way at noon. A festival will follow from 12:30 to 5 p.m. in Sylvester Park, which is located at the corner of Capitol Boulevard and Legion Way downtown.

In addition, a Stonewall Commemorative Ceremony will be held June 28 at a location to be announced. The event will honor the heroes and sheroes who started the fight for queer equality 35 years ago. The ceremony will include speakers and community groups, a celebration of victories and inspiration for the work still to do. Admission is free.
