death in 1995 constituted the three bars being split among his sons. John Adams Jr. took control over CC Slaughters and The Eagle, but in 1998 he was informed that the owners of the Ben Stark Hotel building-which housed the club, now the Ace Hotel-would not renew CC's contract as part of a revisioning of the area.

"It wasn't really a choice," explains Pettit. "It was back then the people that were buying on Stark didn't want that clientele."
