Debaters Eye Pacific Meet

The first tournament of the year is coming up for members of Ashland High School's debate team. It will be held on Dec. 13 and 14 at Pacific University at Forest Grove. Events will be men and women's divisions of debate, extempore speaking, oratory, humorous interpretations, and serious interpretations. The extempore topic is labor-management relations. Speakers will be given 30 minutes to prepare a six-minute talk on some phase of the topic. Debating will be on the resolution: Resolved: that direct United States economic aid to individual countries should be limited to technical assistance and disaster relief.

Speakers in each event have three preliminary rounds in which they are given a 1, 2, 3, or 4 depending on their rank. Speakers with the lowest accumulative score go into the finals where the winners are determined.

Last year's team received second place in men's extemp and third place in women's debate. Trying to better that record this year are: Larry Neal, senior, entering debate, extemp, and oratory; Barbara Stoddard, senior, debate, extemp, and serious interpretation; Jane Yaple, junior, debate, extemp, and oratory; Nancy Lininger, junior, debate, and humorous; Tom Connor, senior, debate and extemp; and Frank Conley, senior, debate and extemp.

These three debate teams will leave Ashland for the tournament by chartered bus Wednesday, Dec. 12.
