The busy senior, who includes among her many interests editorship of the Rogue News and state forensic honors, has been chosen by the Rogue Valley Girl Scout Council to attend one of the Jubilee Camps sponsored by the Girl Guide Association in Great Britain.

Girl Guides, who are counterparts of Girl Scouts, in their program this year will celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of their organization by holding Jubilee Camps in England and northern Ireland during the summer. Twenty-two senior Scouts accompanied by two leaders will travel together, going to various camps in small groups. They will be gone from July 13 to August 24.
