GRAVEYARD REVISITED

While at Emigrant Lake, a thrilling place to visit is the ancient graveyard located on the western shore.

The surrounding land was given by Isaac and Ellmore Hill for a free burial ground during the Indian war of 1853. Marilyn Hill Gillette fell heir to part of the grounds in 1864, and reserved two acres for the graveyard. Today, the graveyard covers half an acre, and has been fenced and improved.

The oldest recorded person buried in the graveyard was born in 1851 and died in 1895. The most recent grave was dug in 1960. Two graves are unknown.

"Death, thou art but another birth.
Freeing the spirits from the clogs of earth."

"Weep not for your babe who dieth,
For he sleeps and is at rest;
The couch whereon he lieth
Is the green earth's quiet breast."
