Ashland footballer, Bob Voris, was a unanimous choice on the all-state second all-conference team, selected by the Oregon Journal and was given honorable mention on the Oregonian's all-state team.

Bob, a senior halfback, was the Grizzlies leading ground-gainer and scorer. In nine games this season he carried the ball 153 times for 1312 yards, an average gain of 8.6 yards per carry, and scored 71 points on 11 touchdowns and 5 extra points.
