



## City Voters Pass Bond Issue

### 3-1 Margin Gives \$2.4 Million For Remodeling

Overwhelmingly passing the bill, a small number of Ashland voters voted on the 1965 school bond issue recently.

The bill, which supplies the city with \$2.4 million for financing acquisitions, remodeling, and new building construction, was authorized 1,197 yes to 372 no for a three to one margin. At the time of the unofficial releases, 28 ballots were challenged.

"I am very pleased with the outcome," said Superintendent Stanley C. Jobe. "The vote will benefit future generations of Ashland school pupils."

This was the second time in six years that Ashland voters passed a bill to finance such construction. In 1959, the city voted on a \$1,275,000 bond issue to build a new junior high school. Final vote in that election was

1,667 yes and 720 no. Another issue, \$1,183,000, to finance two junior high schools was defeated in 1957 by a three to one margin.

**Negotiations Started**  
According to Superintendent Jobe, negotiations have started on securing the financing authorized. Top priority has been named to the new high school issue, a new elementary school, additions to the junior high school, and purchase of property adjoining Lincoln school.

Architectural drawings have started to take shape for the new elementary school, while detailed planning of the high school will be held off for a while.

#### AHS Remodeling

The remodeling program at Ashland Senior High calling for \$1 million is the major feature of the bond issue.

The AHS staff is working on plans for several buildings in close proximity, each housing certain departments. Because of the growing number of students at AHS and because of flexibility, the new high school was planned in the campus concept.

New buildings will be constructed where the main parking lot and Curry's Plumbing stands, to house the math department; near Siskiyou Boulevard, to house English, history, economics, speech, drama, and foreign language departments. The old high school building will be phased out over the next three years and replaced as rapidly as possible.

#### Library

The library and home economics departments will be retained and added on to when the old building is torn down.

The campus plan will call for a centrally-located building to hold lockers. This will probably be located where the parking lot street is today.

Across Mountain Ave. may be the new student parking lot plus the space next to the church.

"Buildings will be planned to fit the programs," said Jobe, "not the programs to fit the buildings." For this reason, it may be a year before definite drawings of the new school will be released.

## Debaters Place Second; Christy, Hassell Win Six

Fourteen students representing Ashland High School in the annual Southwest Oregon Invitational Debate Tournament in Coos Bay, November 12 and 13, finished in second place, one point behind the Medford team.

Cathy Christy and Donna Hassell earned top honors, winning first place out of 17 teams in the debate division. They finished the tourney with a record of six straight wins. Cathy also received the only other first place trophy for Ashland in the extemporaneous speaking division. Donna earned a second place win for her humorous interpretation. A second place was also awarded to Jackie Peterson in the radio speaking division.

Several members qualified for finals but did not place. They were Jackie Peterson and Ellen Craft, debate; Curtis White and Ginny Lawrence, extemporaneous speaking; Cathy Christy, impromptu speaking; Mary Alley, humorous interpretation; and Kris Nashlund and Paula Hoffman, poetry.

The over-all debate record showed Ashland teams winning 15 while losing four. In individual events, eight of the 14 entries qualified for the finals.

Yesterday the team left for Forest Grove for the annual Pacific University tournament. Entries in the contest are: Cathy Christy, Donna Hassell, Ellen Craft, Jackie Peterson, Mary Alley, Paula Hoffman, Kris Nashlund, Mike Lewis, Linda Walker, and Jorja Keil, oxford debate; Cathy Phelps, Ginny Lawrence, Scott Weaver, and Curtis White, Lincoln-Douglas debate; Cathy Christy, Curtis White, and Ginny Lawrence, extemporaneous speaking; Mike Lewis, Jackie Peterson, Donna Hassell, and Jorja Keil, oratory; Ellen Craft, Kris Nashlund, Paula Hoffman, and Cathy Christy, serious interpretation; and Donna Hassell, Mary Alley, and Linda Wenker, humorous interpretation.

The team will be out to top last year's showing at Pacific when Scott Weaver's first place in Junior Division Lincoln-Douglas debate was the only place earned by the Ashland squad.

Attendance at the tourney was estimated to be approximately 760 students representing 50 high schools from throughout the state.
