The group plans to leave June 8, with four adults accompanying them on the two-week trip.

The students plan to extend a helping hand to the poverty-stricken people living in a dump outside the city limits of T guana, Mexico. Students in the have been collecting donations

supplies, and clothing. They have also held many fund raising projects, like washing cars and collecting bottles, to help finance the trip.

Travel to their destination is estimated to take at least two days Approximately three of four days will be spent with the Mexican people, helping distribute the clothing and

medical supplies.

Dr. Neil Mothason attended one of the special education class sessions and gave the class the trip idea.

Dr. Mothason discussed with the students stories he had read in a California newspap Joe Brown, from Pomona. Calif., who at one time was traveling with a church group, when the bus they were traveling in developed trouble near

Tijuana, Mexico. Brown walked for help and in the course of his search for help, he discovered approximately 150 people living in a dump. The people lacked food, water, and medical supplies.
