**CAN ASHLAND AFFORD IT?**

The spirit behind the plan at Ashland for holding up the agricultural college appropriation is not representative of the real Ashland. It is misrepresentative of that city and places it in a false light before the rest of the state. There is nowhere any sympathy with the proposed referendum. The agricultural college is everywhere known to be in dire need of additional sustenance. The demands by students for instruction far exceed its facilities. With a greater student attendance it has less than half the state support accorded by the state of Washington to its agricultural college. Yet it is doing a work that is hailed everywhere in Oregon with universal approval. It is the farms, the orchards, the mines, the shops and the other industrial phases of Oregon life that the college is serving.

Heads of industrial establishments in Portland say the graduates are more intelligent and more devoted to their work than any to be obtained. Observers in every part of the state are declaring that agriculture, horticulture and country home life are being given vast impetus by the young people educated annually at the institution. Its output is a stream of experts flowing into the industrial life of the state. No force is building faster or more potentially for Oregon's development and progress. In dollars and cents

it is impossible to measure the vast benefit the institution is conferring upon the state. To strangle it with insufficient sustenance would be an absolute blow at the welfare of the state. To scuttle it with a referendum of funds for which there is a crying need would be to slap the state's progress in the face. There is not a citizen of Portland, of Salem, of Ashland or of any other part of the state but should be alert in fostering the institution rather than planning to strangle it. It belies Ashland and belies Oregon for the matter of this referendum to be even suggested.

The college is now organized for an approach to perfection in its work. It has an executive head who is the peer of any man in his calling in the country. Oregon is fortunate in having secured a man of such power for organization and intelligent direction. He is in intimate touch with the industrial forces of the state as represented on its farms, its fields and its factories, and has the most intense sympathy with their aspirations and their possibilities. The 1400 students receiving training each year at the institution are a recruiting nucleus for leading the state's industrial forces into their highest potentiality. The few thousands the legislature has appropriated are worth millions to the state and its people and will yield interest on the investment a thousandfold. The sentiment of the state is practically unanimous in approval of this appropriation. Can the people of the excellent city of Ashland afford to assume the responsibility of strangling this college of the common people?

The above editorial from the Portland Journal is another evidence of the friendly feeling which that paper has always shown towards OAC and it will certainly be appreciated by every friend of the college throughout the state.

**NEW TELEPHONE DIRECTORY**

Subscribers Should Call by Numbers to Get Prompt Service

Call by numbers. The Independent Telephone Company has a new directory out and the same is now being distributed. The directory contains a list of all of the towns in Oregon, Washington and British Columbia which may be reached over the Independent Telephone line, and this list is supplemented by a map of the Northwest coast with the line marked thereon. The directory proper is a complete list of all the subscribers of the Independent Telephone Company in Benton and Linn counties alphabetically arranged, and in addition there is a business directory classified according to the different businesses.

Among other places showing a considerable list of users of the Independent Telephone Company besides Corvallis and Albany is Alsea, Bellfountain, Lebanon, Brownsville, Crawfordville, Plainview, Sweet Home, Seio, Tangent and Peoria.

Since the directory was issued several new names have been added and these are on a supplemental list which occurs in the front part of the directory.

It is the intention of the company to furnish their subscribers each month with a supplemental list showing new telephones that have been added, and also changes that have been made since the last directory was issued. In this way the subscriber's directory will be kept up to date. The company especially requests that their patrons call by numbers instead of by names. This is not so much on account of the company's convenience as it is for the convenience of the subscriber and his more prompt and efficient service. When parties are called by names, it is frequently necessary for the operator to consult her directory requiring a certain amount of time and thus delaying the call. If subscribers will use the numbers, this will be avoided and the operator can get parties much more quickly.

The directory also contains an invitation to all patrons to visit the office any day from two to five o'clock in the afternoon to witness the operation of the new and up to date exchange which is complete with all modern appointments. J. C. Lowe, Local Manager.

**Plenty of Water.**

That Corvallis is amply provided with water for use in the event of fire was fully demonstrated Saturday evening when the fire department, under the direction of Chief M. M. Long and Superintendent J. M. Aldrich, made a test of the pressure at the corner of Second and Jefferson streets. Three hundred feet of hose was laid and with a one and one-quarter inch nozzle a powerful

stream was thrown at least 100 feet, the force being all that could be desired. This was a splendid test and shows the efficiency of the water system.

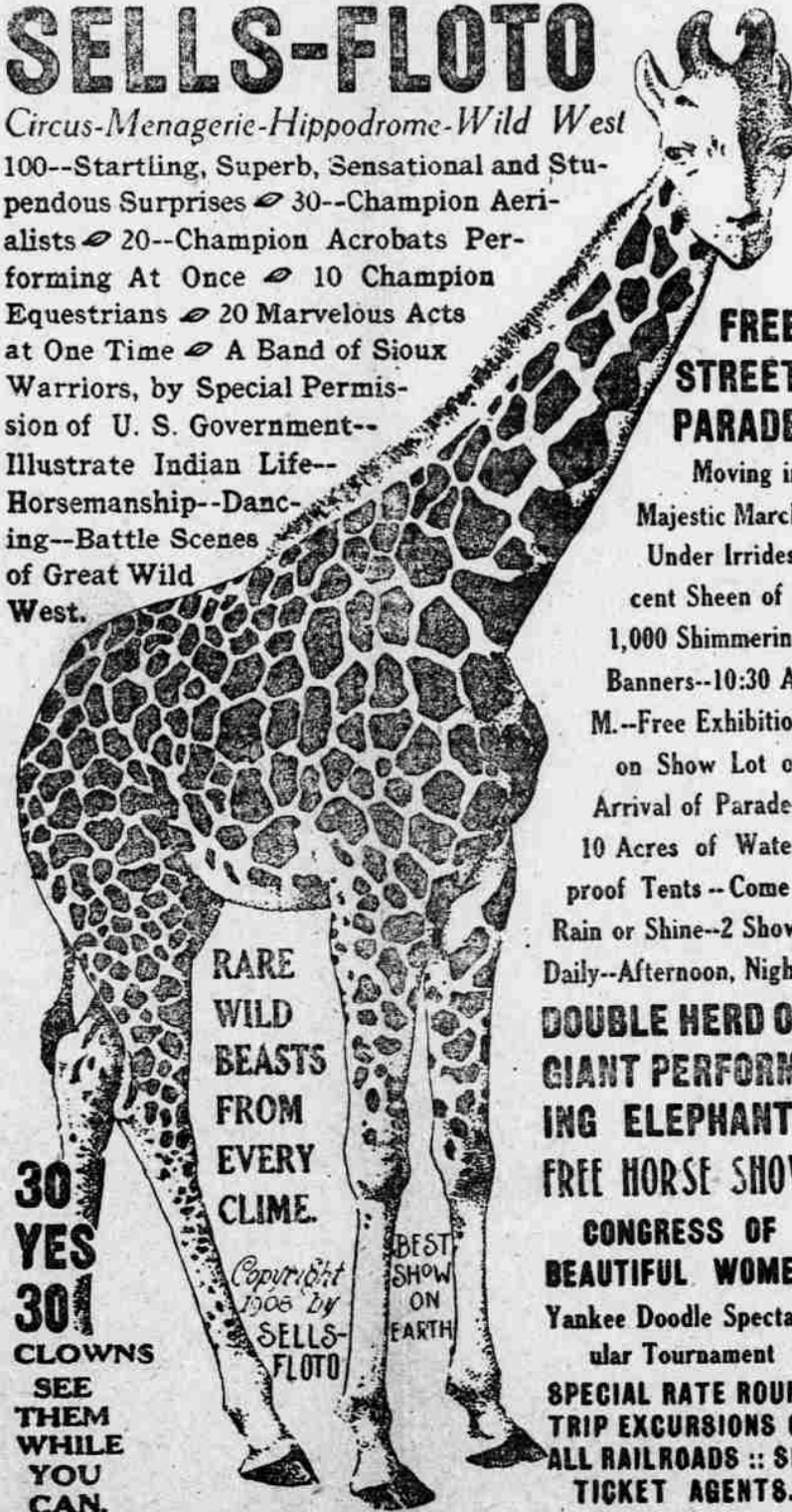
