Betty Jean Lovett, 82, longtime Halfway resident, died and was reunited with the love of her life, Karl on Valentine's Day, February 14, 2015 at Settler's Park in Baker City after a short valiant fight with pancreatic cancer. Although there will not be a formal service, she will be interred at a later date with her husband Karl at Pine Haven Cemetery in Halfway, Oregon.

Betty was born on May 23, 1932 in Mattoon, Illinois to Bert and Reatha (Hyland) Ritchey. Betty grew up in Arizona, attended school and graduated from Flagstaff High School on May 24, 1951. In school she enjoyed and studied home economics, science and arts. After school, she claimed to of "traveled everywhere." And she did, from Arizona to Washington to Idaho, Texas, Nevada, Kansas and on and on.

She met and married whom she referred to as "the true love of her life" Karl Lovett in Mexico followed shortly after they wed again in 1971 in Weiser, Idaho. Betty and Karl had quite a love for each other. He wrote her hundreds of love letters of which she kept each and every one.

During her life she worked as a waitress/hostess and as a cook. She also supervised an animal shelter in Bend and also one in Montana. Betty enjoyed working with her husband Karl and at

one point, they worked together in a hospital lab.

Karl was diagnosed with diabetes, it was then that Betty became "nurse Betty." She meticulously monitored his insulin by keeping well kept journals of his levels, his intake and times that each task or aid was rendered.

Each year, Betty entered her arts and crafts in the Labor Day Fair Exhibition booth. She loved each and every ribbon she received. She enjoyed spending time with the pre-school and all the "little kids." The children as well as many in the community lovingly referred to her as "Grandma Betty." Every year, Betty had a Christmas list of gifts to share with so many, each gift wrapped, each gift given with love. There was one particular year that she was deemed the "Christmas elf." Betty also enjoyed going to Bingo at the VFW Hall in Halfway and the New Bridge Grange.

Betty's hair, the long braids. Betty at 82, barely had a gray hair on her head. It took just about seven years to grow her hair down to her hips. Then she would cut the braids off, and start over.

Betty was a fixture of Halfway, Oregon. She would be seen daily with her shopping basket on her stroll to town. Betty always had such a cute smile and genuinely cared about those around her.

A favorite poem of Betty's - Entitled "Love and Friendship" You're the one I most admire, with great intentions and loving desires. Passion and trust and knowing that you care, brings a lifetime of Happiness for us to

share... Being so gentle, understanding, and kind, brings comfort, faith, and a Joy that shines. Tears and laughter are feelings that's rare, but a true heart shall Never despair ... Love is unique in its very own way, taking risks, and challenges -Day by day.

"But when a heart is made of gold, there is so much to share. Like joy, Laughter, and a friendship that's there...So I give you my heart as a token of love, from one friend to another, And the heaven's above. So take my heart and cherish it too, cause there is no us without You!"

She was preceded in death by her parents, husband Karl, brother Bert Jr., Charles, James; sister Charlot; her most recent four legged companions "Rowdy & Flicka." Betty is survived by her sisters Helen and husband Jack McCrain, Edith Cunningham and Patricia and husband Bob Keel; brother Robert and wife Emma Ritchey; numerous nieces, nephews and cousins.

Baker City, 1931-2015

Bonnie Ilene Entermille, 83, died Monday February 16, 2015 at her daughter's home in Baker City, Oregon from metastatic breast cancer. A Traditional Funeral Service was held at the Seventh-Day Adventist Church in Baker

City on Saturday, February 21, 2015. Interment at Mt. Hope Cemetery in Baker City, Oregon.

Bonnie was born November 11, 1931 at her Aunt Jane Boyce's home on Balm Street in Baker City, Oregon. (The family lived in the 5 Mile Creek area of Richland, Oregon near Little Lookout Mountain.) Her parents were Lurana Ann (Hall) Gray and John Osborne Gray and she was the 5th child of this union. Siblings included John "Riley," Almyra Marjory "Marge," Franklyn Isaiah "Frank" and Fredrick Earl "Fred." Frank and Fred, who owned and operated Gray's TV in Baker were affectionately known in the family circle as "the boy twins" for their closeness despite five years difference in age.

Bonnie and Marge shared similar bonding and although 11 years separated them were called "the girl twins."

July 1, 1952 Bonnie married Donald "Don" Junior Entermille "in the home of a minister down in South Baker on 4th Street." "Junior" was a made up middle name. Don had none at birth. His mother supplied this name for Navy enlistment purposes, much to his disgust. Bonnie often stated she would "never marry a man who didn't love cats." Don fit the bill and a good thing, for she had numerous cats and kittens in her busy home. Don was previously married and divorced and Bonnie joyfully welcomed his four year old daughter, Alicia Jane into their family.
