Emery Barnes, who played such a whale of a game with his Oregon teammates against the potent Uclans of California in the huge Los Angeles Coliseum, was mentioned on the Chicago Tribune's All-American team as an honorable end. Barnes also was named on the University of Oregon's Daily Emerald's All-Coast defensive team.

Backing up his partner in football larceny was the Duck's great competitive linebacker, Emmett Williams. The Chicago-reared Williams was named by the United Press on the Pacific Coast's first grid eleven. He too was given billing on the Emerald's All-Star selections, gaining a second team berth on the all-coast defensive team.

Recognition is due to two other Oregon football warriors who lettered in their first year of college varsity football warfare, Portland's Roosevelt high school's Ben Johnson and a Riverside JC transfer, Mel Streeter. The latter is better known for his basketball activity at the Eugene university.

Roy Dandridge, the stellar veteran performer at third base for the Minneapolis Millers was sold to the Sacramento Solons and will see action in the Pacific coast circuit next year.

Although the Jefferson Democrats failed to make the Oregon state finals in A-1 football this year, their standout lineman, Eddie Phillips received the rave of coaches as one of the most outstanding guards in the state. Two of his grid buddies, Dallas Renfro and L. Redditt, played a terrific game against the eventual state champions, Central Catholic.

Displaying unusual running ability against the hefty charges of a huge Ram line, diminutive Jimmy Williams was undoubtedly the star of the prep prize game between Central and Benson, a game which marked for the first time a tangle of two all boys schools in the finals of top prep football competition. His teammate, Jerry Gowin, deserves recognition for the fine play he showed in aiding the Techmen to their final berth position.

Named to All-Star positions on the Northwest conference's top team were slippery little Chuck Lewis of Willamette and R. C. Owens, the great defensive and offensive end for the College of Idaho's co-champion Coyotes. Lewis was a prep star at Garfield high school in Seattle. Owens hails from Southern California.

That little tournament golf wizard from Seattle, and a former Portlander, Billy Wright, is holding down a starting berth on the Franklin high basketball five in Seattle. Wright plays forward and is blazing quite an athletic trail for himself in that Puget Sound city.
