Whether you travel or stay at home, be a housewife or a career gal, if your age is 5 or 55 — your wardrobe is incomplete without at least one knitted garment. Knits are as popular and practical today as they were when grandmother was a girl.

You will enjoy owning a knit, whether it is a coat, suit, dress or even the new short "hot dog" jamaicas.

Looking ahead, whether you plan to shop around, knit, or just place an order with your favorite knitter, here's a "sneak preview" of what the fall knit fashion look will be.

Mohair, boucles and souffles will give warmth and weightless bulk in coats, dresses and suits for less dressy wear. Thick-and-thin yarns and crunchy tweed yarns will give a hand-loomed character.

The silhouette will be lightly fitted, slim but "easy." Watch for new unpressed panel pleats in knits. Waistlines will be dropped for casual clothes and raised slightly for dressier fashions. Hemlines are expected to stay about the same, dropping just a bit for daytime wear. Cowl necklines and attached hoods will look new.

Fall colors will feature camel and gray (together or separately) as the two major "neutrals." There will be clear, true reds, browns that range from bitter chocolate (almost black) to medium olive brown. Blues will range from baby blue to lively royal to bright navy, and will be mixed with greens and browns. Although yellowed greens will still be in fashion, there will also be bright emeralds and bottle green. For evening, you'll see pale greens, blues, mauve pink and ivory, as well as your clear reds.
