As usual there will be a Christmas tree decorated by some of the students.

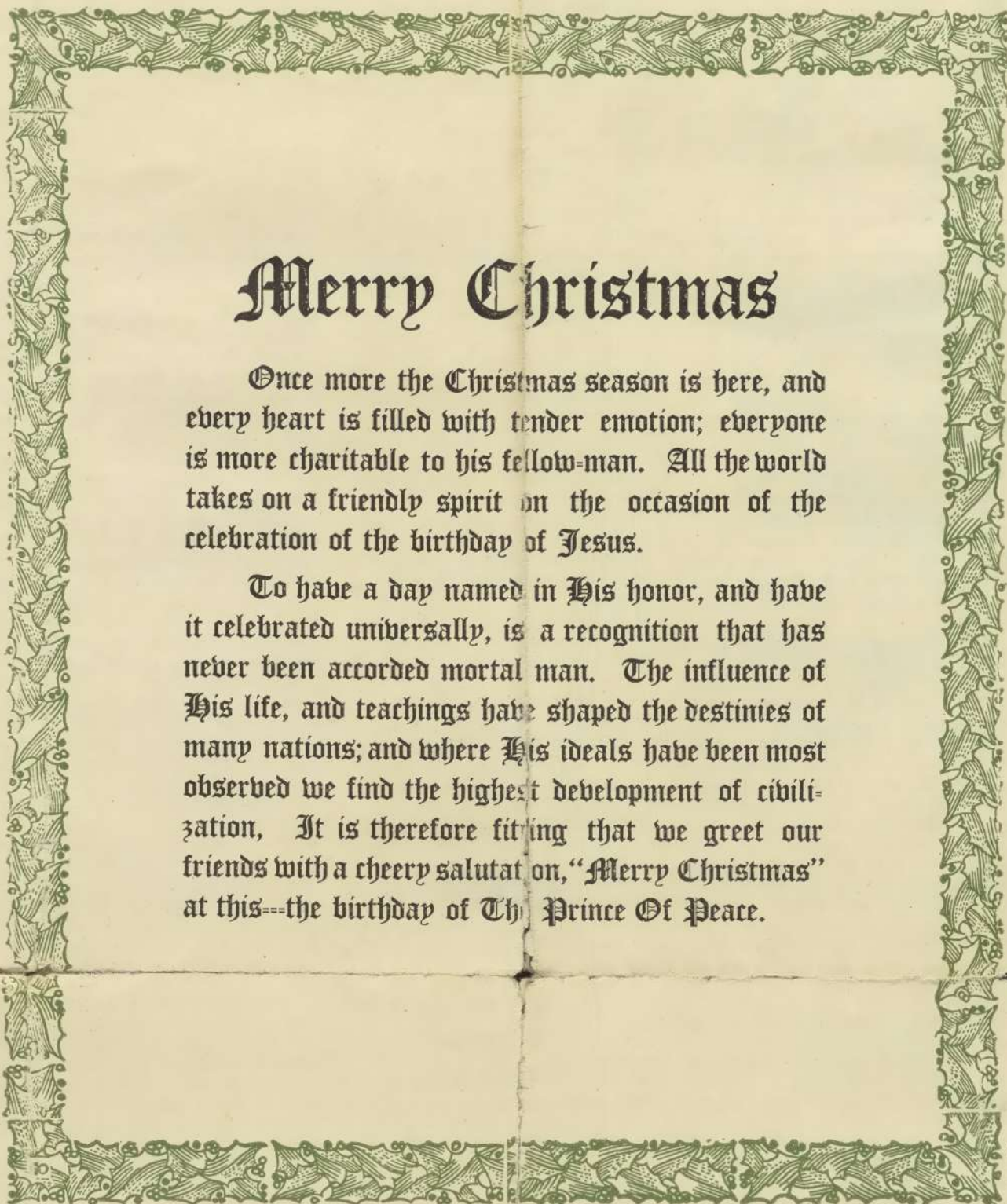
