The Lions won their first game of the season when they defeated Molalla on the local gridiron, by the score of 41 to 6.

The W. L. line charged and blocked with a machine like motion, which the backs by plunging, twisting, and long sweeping end runs and a spectacular aerial attack gave the fans thrill after thrill. The backs when downed were generally grabbed by Molalla secondary defense. Davidson and Ross gained repeatedly through the line.

Mulky kicked off to Molalla who returned to the 35 yard line. Three attempts netted only six yards. On the fourth they kicked to Davidson who was downed on his own 41 yard line. Line plunges by Davidson and Ross made first down. A pass from Warren to Wiedeman placed the pigskin on the 25 yard line. Ross made 6 yards in the next play and a pass from Warren to Aden was carried over for a touch down. An attempted pass for the extra point failed, leaving the score West Linn 6, Molalla 0.

The ball changed hands many times with the lines threatening to score time after time. Molalla was able to keep them from crossing the goal. Towards the end of the half Molalla recovered a West Linn fumble and started a march against time which resulted in a touchdown just as the guns ended the half. They failed to convert. Score West Linn 6 and Molalla 6.

Early in the third quarter the Lions started a determined march for another touchdown. Davidson made eight yards, and a pass from Warren to Dunmire put the ball in the 29 yard line. Ross made six yards through center and Davidson skirted left end for 14 yards. Three line plunges brought the ball within 8 inches of the goal. In the next play Davidson stepped over the goal. A pass from Warren to Davidson was successful for the extra point. Score West Linn 13, Molalla 6. Molalla received the kick-off and was downed in their 30 yard line. Two passes were knocked down and a line plunge netted only 2 yards. On the next play they attempted to kick, but Logdsen, end, rushed in and got the ball just as it left the punter's toe and galloped for a touchdown unmolested. Davidson converted for extra point; score West Linn 20, Molalla 6.

Again Molalla received the kick-off and they started passing in an attempt to score. Two passes dropped to the ground and the third was intercepted by Ross who returned to their 26 yard line. On the fourth down a pass from Warren to Logdsen who was waiting in the end zone netted six more points. Davidson converted. Score now, West Linn 27, Molalla 6.

A blocked punt by Swenson and a Molalla recovery forced them to kick from behind their goal line. Warren received it on the 20 yard line. A lateral pass from Warren to Aden and then to Davidson netted another touchdown. Try for point was successful. Score, West Linn 34, Molalla 6.
