W. L. and O. C. To Clash Next Friday

Next Friday night will see the continuing of the feud between the West Linn Lions and the Oregon City Pioneers, when the two teams clash at Kelly Stadium.

According to present dope, Oregon City, under Coach Dimick, is favored to defeat Coach Brown's boys from West Linn. The condition of the field may have a great deal to do with the first outcome of the game. A fast field and a dry ball are in favor of the attacks of both teams. The Pioneers' running attack is sparked by Leatherberry, a fast, shifty ball carrier; while the Lions will resort to a heavy aerial barrage if possible.

The extent of Reuben Baisch's foot injury has yet to be determined. If Reuben is not at his best it will weaken the power of the W. L. attack.

James W. Mott Answers Queries

In an interview Thursday, October 24, Representative James W. Mott of the First Congressional district of Oregon stated that by 1945 the United States navy expansion program would be completed. By that time the navy will be up to its authorized tonnage, which is 3,000,000 tons. Congressman Mott, a member of the Naval Affairs committee stated that in the present navy there are 15 battleships, 6 airplane-carriers, 18 heavy cruisers, 19 light cruisers, 64 submarines, and 185 destroyers, making a total of 305 ships of war. The present tonnage is 1,724,000. In reply to the question if men were to be drafted to the navy, the Representative said that under the conscription bill, men may be drafted into the navy but at present there is no need as there are 7,000 men on the waiting list.

By authority of the defense bill passed last summer, the navy will be increased by 1,325,000 tons. The navy will be complete by 1945 and the army will be finished in 1942.

Although congress is technically still in session, but by vote of the members it was decided not to enact any business until after election. Taking advantage of this adjournment, Mr. Mott came home until after election.

Other committees that Oregon's representative is a member of are the public lands and roads committees. The public lands committee is vital to Oregon as 54 percent of the lands of

West Linn's football team under Coaches J. P. Brown and Sam Nixon will meet the Beaverton squad on the West Linn field this afternoon, in the Lions' most important league game of the season.

The game will probably not be very fast or flashy due to the very sloppy condition of the field, which will seriously slow down West Linn's passing attack. The running power of the W. L. team may depend to a large extent upon the condition of Reuben Baisch's foot injury since the mud will slow up Elliot and Merkle.

West Linn will be the underdog, due to their 7 to 0 defeat at the hands of Hillsboro last week. Beaverton is still undefeated after beating Sherwood 20 to 0 last Friday night.

The Lions' passing attack will be built around Bob Steffen, Bill Stevens and Don Redhead. The probable starting line-up for West Linn will be Stevens and Critchfield at the ends; Donovan and Buckles at the tackle positions; Kahle and Ness at guard; and King centering. Vinton, Merkle, Langliers, and either Baisch or Steffen will start at the back-field positions.

Faculty to Attend Tri County Institute

The faculty members of West Linn high school will attend the Tri-County Institute which will be held Wednesday November 6, at the Salem high school.
