School Poll Yields More Information

The school poll, taken some weeks ago has yielded additional information. According to results, West Linn students have tacked their unofficial approval on a reduction in the price of student body tickets.

Of votes received, 57 per cent favored a reduction, although few gave suggestions about how to make up for the possible loss of revenue. Both members and non-members voted for the reduction. Of ticket holders, 52 per cent favored the proposals while over 64 per cent of non-members approved.

The sophomores voted down the reduction in their class but they were outnumbered by the affirmative vote of the other classes.

When asked about the financial possibilities of a reduction, Student Body Advisor Fors said that it would be necessary to study the matter carefully before any definite answer could be made. Said he "At the present time I believe that students will have to ask for less on their tickets if they are to get them for less."

The financial department of the student body plans to make a detailed report of student body pecuniary systems to students. Graphs will be used to show pupils exactly how their money is spent.
