## Music Division To Participate in District Contest

Oregon City high school will be represented at the District Music contest, to be held at Newberg on April 18 and 19. The Oregon City orchestra, band, and Boys' and Girls' glee club will attend.

The band will play "His Honor," march, "Transcendence Overture," and the first movement of the Saint-Saens symphony. The orchestra will play "Lucia Silla Overture," by Mozart, and "Iphigenia in Aulis," by Gluck. The Girls' glee club will sing "Far O'er The Bay," by Frank, and "Flower of Dreams," by Clokey. The Boys' glee club will sing "God Is a Spirit," by Scholin-Gore, and "Scandia," by Gaines.

The music schedule is very full from now till the last of the year, stated Mr. Richardson. The string orchestra and picked Glee club will go to Corvallis April 5 to perform over KOAC.

A concert given by all musical organizations of Oregon City high school will be given May 5 for the public, and an afternoon performance will be given for all students.

A great many appearances have been scheduled during National Music week, May 4 to May 10.

The Swing band will play for the senior play tonight.

## Oral Expression Classes Present One-Act Plays

Members of the oral expression classes have been presenting one act plays as a part of their regular class work.

The students work in groups of two and can have other students help with the makeup, costumes and stage managing.

The plays are put on in the manner of professional actors and actresses, with costumes, makeup, and properties that fit the occasion. Students do their own directing and select their own type of costuming and furniture, and make programs for the other members of the class.

Seven of these plays have been given and the remainder of them will be given after the senior play.

As a part of their study of food buying, the Home Economics III classes, under the supervision of Mrs. Justine O'Reilly made two field trips, Wednesday, March 19, at which time one group visited the Columbia Foods market, and the other, the Fox dairy farm.

Mr. Jack Lynch, manager of the Columbia Foods market gave the girls many valuable hints on what to look for, and what to avoid when buying fresh fruits and vegetables.

Mr. and Mrs. Fox showed the girls their dairy herd in the barn and then permitted the girls to look in the milk room. Since the milk room had been sterilized for the next milking, no one was allowed to step into it. Mrs. Fox emphasized the importance of investigating the dairy from which you take milk. She recommended that consumers ask to see various test results on the milk they buy.
