The game was originally scheduled for seven innings, but in the last half of the seventh with Canby leading 4 to 3, Williams, the West Linn moundsman, blasted out a home run to tie the score.

In the pitching department Williams was credited with five strikeouts and one free pass, while Canby's Buggins whiffed 10 and issued three walks.

West Linn Wins Tri-School Meet

In their last home meet of the year, the West Linn high school track team ground out a victory over Oregon City and Gresham by amassing a total of 54½ points. Oregon City was credited with 53 points and Gresham with 40½ points.

Best marks of the day were made by Harris, Gresham, who heaved the javelin 166 feet 3 inches, and Donovan, West Linn, who tossed the discus out 127 feet 6 inches. Another better than average mark was made by Bevans, Oregon City, who leaped 5 feet 8 inches in the high jump.

High point man of the meet was Riggs, who took firsts in the broad jump, and low hurdles and second in the high hurdles. He was followed by Elliot, West Linn, who took first in the 100 yard dash, second in the pole vault, and third in the 220 yard dash. Swan, West Linn, also garnered 10 points, by getting firsts in the 220 and 440 yard dashes.

Linn Golfers Invited To State Tournament

The West Linn high school student body is in receipt of a letter inviting its golf team to participate in a state tournament to be held on the Laurelwood course in Eugene on May 17.

The state tournament is an annual affair which in recent years has been sponsored by Eugene high and University high school of Eugene. West Linn's teams have frequently placed high in this competition, one year placing fifty and in another walking away with second honors.

The match this year will consist of an 18 hole medal play, with the winners being determined by the lowest team score. An entrance fee of fifty cents per school is being charged. Team members will be entertained in the fraternity houses of the University.

SPRING SPORTS REVIEW

West Linn has been very successful in both baseball and track as we enter the middle of the season by taking the lead each time except for a second in a five-way track meet.

West Linn won over Tigard with a score of 12 to 3 on the West Linn field. Jennings, who pitched the entire game for West Linn allowed only one hit after the first inning in which the Tigard pine, by two hits and two errors, made three runs.

The West Linn squad made only five hits which were very hard and caused the Tigard squad to commit six errors. Out of the five hits, there were two triples, one double and two singles. Bartholomew, first base and Schmidt, center field made the triples while Hollenbeck, flashy Lion catcher hit the double. It undoubtedly would have been a home run had a pile of dirt been out in right field not slowed it down.

In a game with Columbia Prep, the Lions defeated them, 3 to 1. Morrison, the Prep hurler allowed the West Linn lads only two hits, but issued seven passes which with three errors from his teammates allowed for West Linn's three unearned runs. The two hits were singles made by Eaden, third base and Williams, pitcher.

Williams, the Lion hurler allowed four runs but with excellent assistance from his team mates, held the Columbia team to one run.

The West Linn track team won two second places at the annual Hill relays at Hill Military. The spring medley, composed of Elliot, Swan, Holt and D. Holden, placed first in their heat but due to Beaverton's faster time in another heat, the West Linn boys were awarded second place.

The distance medley composed of Stevens, Kruse, Yeomans and Meyers also placed a second, while West Linn's third team, the mile relay won third in their heat but were not passed in the finals because of faster time in other heats. In all, the West Linn men carried off eight medals.

Golfers to Meet Tigard May 5

The West Linn golf team is scheduled to meet Tigard on the Oswego Country club course Monday, May 5.

In the previous two matches between the schools, honors have been evenly divided. Tigard won the first and West Linn came back strong to take the second. The local divot diggers, showing much improvement in recent practice sessions, give promise of developing into a winning combination.

The players qualify in each match for position in the next. The player with the low score automatically becomes first man in the next match. Positions at present are: first man and captain, Pete Blyth, second Bill Stevens, third Ernie Butts, fourth, Junior Roe and fifth Tom Arthur who also acts as manager.

Linn won with a margin of 83 points, the score being 102½ to 19½. Merkle, the high-point man of West Linn, with 12 points, after taking first in the javelin, second in shotput, and third in the broad jump. He was followed by Swan with 10 points and the next men were Kruse and Reynolds with 9½ points each.

West Linn took first in every event but one, that being the broad jump.

In a 5-way meet between Scappoose, West Linn, Hill Military, Columbia Prep and Parkrose, Scappoose won with 49½ points and West Linn placed second with 42½ points.

Federspiel, crack Lion high jumper set a new record with a jump of 5 feet 9 inches. The old record was 5-8 set by Bill Stricklin in 1935. Another outstanding feat was made by Perkins of Mill Military who heaved the discus 140 feet.

High point man of the meet was Gates of Scappoose who placed in four events. He was followed by Swan of West Linn who took first in the 220 and the 440 yard dashes.

The West Linn squad was hammered by the absence of several trackmen, one being "Chick" Elliot, star sprinter.
