Lions Defeated By Gresham '9'; Close Decision

A close decision on first base in the last half of the sixth inning, Monday, April 26, at Gresham, in favor of Gresham, cost West Linn another gall game, 4 to 2.

West Linn scored twice in the third inning on consecutive hits by Wolf, Eaden and Elligsen. Wolf started the rally with a terrific line drive, triple over the center fielder's head, then Eaden got a hit through the center of the diamond for a double to score Wolf; then Elligsen got a hit through the same slot to score Eaden.

Gresham got a run in the fourth inning when came the fatal sixth. There were two outs with men on first and second, and a throw to first pulled Brodkorb off the base and as the runner ran by him, he made a sweeping motion with his arm at the runner's back. As the umpire was in a bad position to call the play, he called him safe. There were two outs, and all runners were moving on the play and the tying run scored. Later with the bases loaded, the fourth Gresham hit drove in the two winning tallies.

Bruck, the starting pitcher, hurled a very fine ball game by allowing three hits and walking six batters. As the score was tied, when Bruck was relieved, the loss was not chalked up to him. Robertson relieved Bruck with the bases loaded and the two winning runs were scored off him.

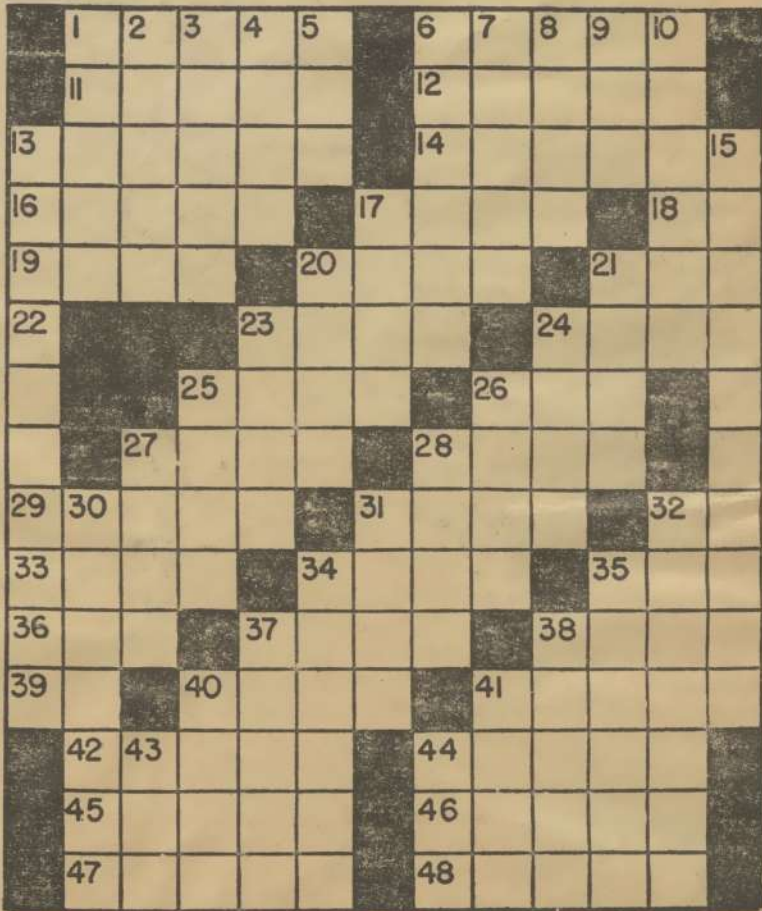
