Eight Games Scheduled

West Linn grid prospects have risen slightly since the first practice two weeks ago. With but two lettermen back in the lineup the team will be composed mostly of last year's second string and young inexperienced players.

The big game being only a week away, the boys have been working hard in order that they may make it three games in a row over the Pioneers.

The Lions tangle with Oregon City on October 1, and have a two weeks rest before tangling with Forest Grove on the 15th, on the West Linn field. October 22 will find the Lions at Beaverton, October 29 at Tigard.

November 5 West Linn takes on Sherwood on the home field. They complete their travels on November 2, when they go to Hillsboro. They complete their games at home, one with Newberg on November 19, and McMinnville on November 24.

Both Teams Prepare for Annual Game

"Ambitious but green" were the words used by Coach J. P. Brown when asked how the football team was progressing. There are some 40 students out for the sport with only two returning lettermen, Johnson and Belieu.

No definite lineup has been made for the Oregon City game, but it is believed that the absence of Walt Logsdon, regular center, will be bad for the team.

The game will be played at the beginning of the season instead of the close so that weather conditions will be more favorable.

"As in all high schools in this district, Oregon City has only two returning lettermen," reported West Linn scouts although some 50 students are taking football.
