



Newberg Hoopers Lose to West Linn

The West Linn high school Lions scored their second league victory here against Newberg on Tuesday night, January 15, with a 36 to 34 score. In the first half, both teams played a tight game and in the first quarter the Lions led 5 to 3. At the half time the score was 11 to 10 in favor of the Lions.

The second half saw both teams playing a faster game, both teams piling up a few more points and at the end of the third quarter West Linn led 26 to 24. The last period, a rough and rugged affair, put the Lions ahead 36 to 28 until the last few minutes of play when the Newberg Tigers once more caught their eye and narrowed the score to 36 to 34 at the end of the game.

Smith of West Linn led the scoring with 15 counters, followed closely by Spidel of Newberg, who scored 12 points.

Both teams fouled excessively, four men were taken from the game on personal fouls, three from West Linn and one from Newberg. As a team West Linn had 23 and Newberg had 18.

This is the second league win for the Lions. The only other being against Tigard.

In the preliminary game, the West Linn "B" squad was defeated 23 to 27 by Newberg. The score by quarters was as follows: First quarter, West Linn 9, Newberg 13; second, West Linn 10, Newberg 13; third, West Linn 19, Newberg 16; fourth, West Linn 23, Newberg 27.

The West Linn Lions downed Tillamook here Tuesday night, January 22, 34 to 25 on the Lions floor. The Lions led at the half 18 to 10.

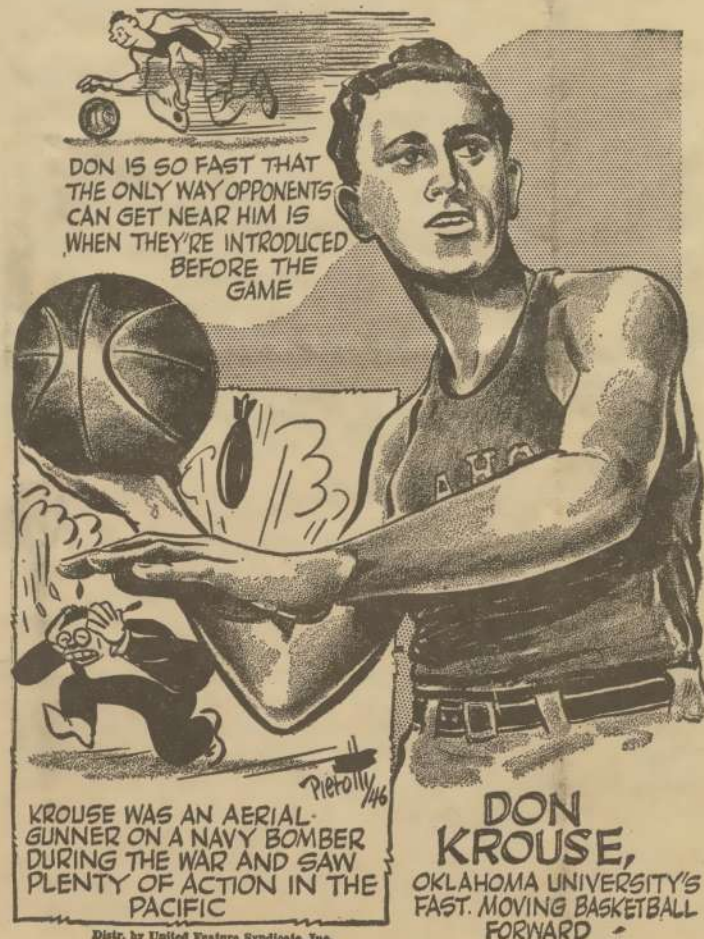
