W.L. Cindermen Cop Fifth in TYV League

West Linn placed fifth in the annual TYV track meet, held at Beaverton, Friday, April 29. Beaverton scored 76-3/5 to take first place, followed by Hillsboro with 69-3/5. Oregon City took third place with 32, followed very closely by McMinnville with 31-1/5. West Linn took fifth with 21; Forest Grove, sixth with 17%; Newberg, seventh with 15½; and Tigard, with 3 brought up the rear.

Eddie Mead took the only first place position for West Linn with a 156-foot javelin throw. Austin Hull placed second in the javelin toss, second in the 220-yard dash, and fourth in the 100-yard dash. Ronnie Schief was third in the 440, and West Linn placed third in the 880-yard relay.
