

WEST LINN DUMPS VIKINGS 38 TO 0

In a decisive victory here at West Linn November 4 Coach Burnetts' fighting Lions defeated a weak Forest Grove team, 38 to 0.

Ray Town kicked off and booted the ball clear out of the end zone. The Vikings took the ball on their 20 yard line. On the third play of the game after Forest Grove had thrown two incomplete passes, Don Woody recovered a Viking fumble and ran it to the ten yard line. Jim McIntosh drove through for the first touchdown of the game, and then received a pass for the conversion.

West Linn scored again in the first quarter on a pass—Jim McIntosh to Larry Lee—to make the score 13-0.

The touchdown was made possible by a series of runs, one a 28 yard dash made by Don McIntosh which brought the ball up to scoring position on the Vikings' 20 yard line.

The second quarter went by with neither team scoring but with Forest Grove making the most first downs, four to the Lions' two. West Linn received the kickoff on their 22 yard line and marched 78 yards for a touchdown on double and triple reverses, one of these a 40 yard sprint by Larry Lee. Jim McIntosh made the score 19 to 0 on an end run.

West Linn scored again in the third period, this time with Larry Lee carrying the ball around left end.

The final touchdown was made when Dale Stewart intercepted a pass and ran 40 yards with it to the Vikings' 19 yard line. Gary MacMurray ran the ball over for the extra point.

Beavers Bounce Burnett's Boys

West Linn was defeated in the last TYV league game of the season held at Beaverton last November 11 by a score of 8 to 6.

The first quarter was played through with no score but with Beaverton gaining the majority of first downs, five to the Lions' one.

Jimmy Tsugawa, little 137 pound fullback, set up Beaverton's only touchdown with a 20 yard pass to Joe Rolfe, who struggled to the West Linn two yard line before he was tackled. Paul Strandberg made a gain of one yard on a run, and Tsugawa plunged through center to score.

Larry Lee received the kickoff on the 20 and ran it up to the West Linn 40 yard line. The Lions brought the ball up to the Beaverton 30 only to lose it on downs.

Sparked by Tsugawa's passing, the Beavers drove up to the West Linn two yard line. The Lions' line held them out for four downs and took the ball over still on their own two yard line with ten to go. With only time left in the first half for one play, Jim McIntosh faked a punt and handed the ball off to Larry Lee who was caught before he could get out of the end zone. This scored a safety for the Beavers making it 8 to 0.

West Linn's touchdown was made when Dale Stewart intercepted a pass and ran 40 yards with it to the Vikings' 19 yard line. Don McIntosh plunged over from there to score.

GRIDSTERS END PLAY IN SEVENTH PLACE

Another football season has come to an end for West Linn. The Lions completed their season in seventh place with a record of one league win, one tie and five losses. Though ending up in the cellar they had seventy-nine first downs to their opponents' record of sixty-three. All other statistics favored their rivals.

The McIntosh brothers were the yardage go getters, with Don having a net record of 444 yards and Jim 371 yards. Larry Lee was close behind with a net gain of 366 yards.

West Linn 6, Tigard 6

West Linn invaded Tigard for the league opener. Using some tricky reverses and hard line plunges the Lions gained an easy touchdown in the first few minutes of play. In the second quarter Tigard made an end run to tie up the game. In the second half neither team could seem to advance on the other with all play being on midfield and no scoring made.

West Linn 6, Hillsboro 31

The second game was played on the Spartan field. Depending on their passing attack, West Linn just couldn't seem to click. Their lone touchdown was made on a pass from McIntosh to Atchison. The final score was 31 to 6.

West Linn 6, Newberg 12

In the Newberg game West Linn again scored only 6 points. These points were made in the final quarter of play. Newberg won by a 6 point lead. The tables may have been turned if the Lions would have had at their services Larry Lee and Don Atchison, two regulars out because of illness.

West Linn 7, McMinnville 33

When West Linn played McMinnville it looked for a while as though they might give the Grizzlies a bad time when they scored in the first few minutes of play and made their first extra point of the season. In the second quarter McMinnville sparked up and made two touchdowns. In the second half they came out and pushed the Lions all over the field to win 33 to 7.

LIONS AGAIN LOSE AGE OLD CONTEST

In a tense drama staged on the Kelly Field turf and witnessed by nearly three thousand sport fans, the West Linn Lions fell to a 24 to 12 defeat at the hands of the Oregon City Pioneers.

Oregon City scored early in the first quarter when they recovered a West Linn fumble on the Lion's 14 yard line. Harold Tietz plunged over for the touchdown. The kick for the extra point failed.

In the first play after the kickoff Larry Lee took the ball on a triple reverse and sprinted 70 yards for a near touchdown run. He was downed on the Oregon City 6 yard line. Don McIntosh ran the ball around right end to score. West Linn kicked for the extra point, but failed.

On the kickoff Don Anderson fumbled the ball and West Linn recovered on the Pioneer's 30 yard line.

The Lions had outplayed and outfought Oregon City all through the first half, and had the majority of first downs — seven to the Pioneer's three.

In the second half, however things began to look bad for the Lions. Early in the third quarter Don Atchison intercepted an Oregon City pass on the 10 yard line and then fumbled as he was tackled. Oregon City recovered the ball on the Lion's one yard line from where Anderson raced over to score. Oregon City racked up two more touchdowns on long passes, Gutzler to Doug Ness. Another touchdown was racked up for the Pioneers by Bill Bauer on a quarterback sneak.

In the second half West Linn had only three first downs to Oregon City's nine.
