State Parks advocate L.L. "Stub" Stewart honored

Our first state park in more than 30 years has recently opened and has been named in honor of Loran L. "Stub" Stewart, considered by many to be Oregon Parks and Recreation Department's (OPRD) number one supporter.

Stewart began his career in timber in 1946 when he and his brother bought Bohemia Lumber Company. He built it into a multimillion-dollar enterprise, Bohemia Inc., employing more than 2,000 people in mills in Oregon and Northern California. Bohemia was regarded as one of the more progressive forest products companies in the United States, leading the way in the efficient of use of harvested timber. During the late 1970's, Bohemia stunned the

logging industry when it achieved 100 percent log usage by developing a patented extraction process to obtain commercially marketable products from material formerly regarded as waste—Douglas Fir bark.

Stewart was more than a successful businessman; he served nearly 40 years on the



State Parks and Recreation Advisory Committee and the Oregon Parks and Recreation Commission. He also was a state legislator and served in the House of Representatives from 1951-55.

"Stub was a fun fellow who had a strong affinity for volunteers," says Chris Havel, OPRD Communication Coordinator. "Stub donated money to the State Parks to endow funding for volunteer recognition. He considered volunteerism to be the height of community involvement."

Stewart was also involved in the development of the Banks-Vernonia Linear Trail that runs through the new park. The State Parks Commission felt it would be fitting to honor his commitment to the parks system by naming the newest State Park after
