## from the editor...

I've had a chance to see the important role our schools, and the people who work there and run them, play, not just in our children's lives, but in the lives of our community as a whole.

During October, I was around the schools a lot, covering Homecoming Week activities and I saw firsthand just how vital and important -- and fun-- our schools are-- for our students, for their parents and other adults, and for the teachers. It was fun to watch the kids get a little crazy and show their spirit during Air Jams; to watch the Lady Loggers, both JV and Varsity, win exciting volleyball matches during Pack the Gym Night; see Homecoming Queen Souvanny Miller wear her crown all week and see escort Levi Timmerman carry Princess Katy Stevens across that huge puddle as the court was introduced at half time of the football game; and watch the Loggers show so much heart in coming back to tie that Homecoming football game, only to lose in double overtime. Those are memories those kids will have for the rest of their lives-- and that adults in the community share with each other as well.

I also had a chance to meet and interview our six foreign exchange students, young adults who will be making Vernonia their home for the next year. These students come here each year from various countries and continents to live with us, sharing their lives and experiences and sharing in ours as well. What a great opportunity for all of us, and especially our students, to experience life in another culture and to make friends they could never have met any other way.

I have very fond memories of my high school years, of things my friends and I did. But I also don't remember much about the adults in my community. I only knew the parents of a few of my closest friends, and only then in passing. I don't ever remember thinking about my teachers as real people-- people with lives outside of school, people with families, with other interests.

Small rural communities are unique that way. Because our schools fill such a vital role as the cornerstone of so much that happens here, our students have an opportunity to be more engaged in the community. We have students engaged in our community and student leadership programs, students selling yearbook ads to local businesses, students and adults volunteering in our parks and watching sporting events together-- students getting

to know adults as real people. It was interesting for me, and eye-opening, to watch during homecoming as students and teachers interacted together.

We have many wonderful people working in and around our schools, people who are engaged in the lives of our students and engaged in our community-- people like Kathi Fetch, Teri Willard, James Brookins and Barb Carr-- wonderful people who really help make this community a special place.

Hopefully, Vernonia will find a way to build new schools, so our students can continue to have these meaningful experiences and create these wonderful memories right here in their hometown. I just can't imagine a Vernonia without Homecoming, art classes, exchange students and teachers.

I have recently had the chance to reconnect with some old friends through Facebook-- friends I haven't seen or talked to in almost thirty years. It's been fun to find out what they are up to and see photos of their families and activities. OK, nothing too earth-shattering there. What I do find interesting is, as much as we think we've changed, most of us are still very much the same. Thirty years later, the girl who was flirty in high school is still flirty. The guy who was confident and pushy is still a salesman. The guy who was really into music is still into music. The jocks are still jocks and the artsy types are still artsy-- for the most part. And the guy who used to root for the Phillies is still rooting for the Phillies.
