

SHOOTERS HEAD LIST

Local Teams' Scores Highest Up to Date.

ROSEBURG TEAM IS DEFEATED

Private Connor of Lorane Makes Best Showing in Yesterday's Trophy Contest.—The Score.

Col. G. O. Yoran, Commander of the Fourth Regiment, Oregon National Guards, conducted the trophy contest of Company E. of his regiment in Cottage Grove yesterday, amid rain, wind and sunshine. At times the wind gained such velocity that the targets were blown from the frames, making it impossible for the contestants to make as good a score as they would have under more favorable weather conditions. However, Roseburg, which stood at the head of the list, with 578 points was beaten by both the first and second teams. Roseburg was considered the crack team, having won in last year's contest. Private Connor of the second team made the best score of any member of either team, getting 169 points out of a possible 200.

The score of the first team, by members, follows:

BODY LAID AT REST.

Woodmen Perform Last Rites for Max Staudacher.

The funeral of the late Max. Staudacher, who passed away at Eugene Tuesday morning, took place on Wednesday afternoon, and was conducted by the Woodmen of the World of this city, the deceased having been a member of the local camp. Dr. J. O. Van Winkle and C. F. Walker read the ritual and the Rev. Selden Adams of the Presbyterian church preached the funeral service.

Mr. Staudacher died at a Eugene hospital, whither he was taken a short time prior suffering from spinal meningitis. At this time he was employed in one of the Booth-Kelley lumbering camps, but had previously been engaged by the same company at its Saginaw mills. Deceased was twenty-four years of age, and had a large circle of staunch friends who deeply mourn his death.

Lumber News

For a short time in the summer there was fear of over-production on the coast. For more than two months, however, this has been wiped out by a gratifying demand for fir products.

Many of the mills are disposed to take no orders for special stock, and are only for business that will take care of some of the yard stock they have on hand and help balance up the mill stocks. On an average the mills seem to have about two month's business booked ahead. In some cases they report that even yard stock is sold well ahead and they are merely waiting for cars.

Manufacturers of northern woods and yellow pine report more severe competition from the west coast, which shows that fir is making inroads in new territory. The Oregon and Washington Lumber Manufacturers' association is planning some missionary work, which will spread information about the value of fir as an interior finish lumber in territories where it is not fully appreciated. One of the latest moves is to finish a room in the new building belonging to the International Bureau of American Republics, at Washington, D. C. The room will be finished elaborately in Oregon fir and will stand as a strong advertisement of the wood.

That the manufacturers on the coast are getting their courage back to the point where they will undertake work of this character is an encouraging sign. Market extension work is only feasible at a time when there is a healthy demand.—American Lumberman, Oct. 23.

W. T. Hankins, manager of the Row River Lumber Company, reports that the company is installing a mile of endless track cable to extend into a belt of twenty million feet of timber. The cable will run two cars on a regular track handling logs on a very steep grade.

John P. Muller, a prominent lumber man of San Francisco, was in the city looking up old friends and making new ones. Mr. Muller reports lumber conditions in the Bay City improving, and states that he looks for a good business during the fall and winter.

Wm. Skidmore of Curtin Spur was in the city on Monday. Mr. Skidmore is contemplating the installation of a much larger steam power plant than he has at present.

R. C. Angell, official inspector of the Associated Bureau of Grades of the Oregon & Washington mills, was in the city on Tuesday.
