National Holiday Observed in Customary Manner.

RELIGIOUS SERVICES HELD

Governor Benson Issues Proclamation to His Subjects—Thanksgiving Closed by Military Ball by the Guards.

Yesterday was Thanksgiving day, and the most of us gave thanks for the manifold blessings which had been bestowed upon us during the past twelve-month. But while this national holiday is set apart for this especial purpose, it is largely given over to feasting, and judging from the rapid action of the delivery wagons "the day before," the citizens of Cottage Grove were abundantly provided with Thanksgiving goodies. At the Christian church at 10:30 religious services were held, the Rev. Robert Sutcliffe delivering a sermon appropriate to the occasion. In the evening a military ball was given under the auspices of Company E, National Guard, which was a splendid social success.

In keeping with custom Governor Benson issued a proclamation to the people of the state as follows:

"The president of the United States having designated Thursday, November the 25th, 1909, as the national Thanksgiving day, and recommended its fitting observance throughout the land.

"Now, therefore, I, F. W. Benson, governor of the state of Oregon, by the authority in me vested, do designate and proclaim said day as a legal holiday, upon which all public offices shall be closed and business suspended, and I earnestly recommend that our people cease their usual vocations on said day, assemble together in their respective places of worship and there yield their unfeigned thanks to our Heavenly Father for the blessings of life, liberty and happiness; for his goodness and loving kindness to all men; for the returns of the labors of the husbandman and the fruits of the earth.
"Let us beseech him to continue to bestow upon us the favor of his gracious providence, that our land may still yield her increase and that manifold blessing will continue to fall upon our state and nation."

"Some Mountain Top Experiences of Moses," at the Presbyterian church next Sunday morning. "Go In," is the subject of the evening sermon. A choir of fifteen voices, directed by Mr. L. F. Wooley, is now furnishing music at the Sunday services. Miss Dora Johns, presides at the organ.
Mr. J. C. Moss is again able to fill his place as Sunday School Superintendent at the Presbyterian church. The spiritual life of the church is being felt in every department of the church work.

The subject of the morning discourse at the Christian church next Sunday will be "With Christ in a Vineyard." The evening subject will be, "What the Fool said in his Heart." The auxiliary of the Christian Woman's Board of Missions will have charge of the services Sunday morning, December 5th. Rev. F. E. Billington of Eugene will begin a Bible Institute Tuesday evening December 7.
The week of prayer will be followed by at least a week of union service, held at the different churches. The different pastors will do the preaching.
