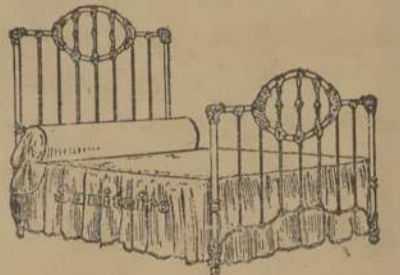

COYOTE EATS 'EM ALIVE.

By the paper I notice that there is a proposition before the city council of Eugene, and the county court has been consulted on it, to sell the courthouse to the city for a city hall. Sometime since I noticed that the county court had ordered the city to remove their present hall from the county property, which they had a right to do.

There is plainly something wrong about this whole matter. The city boomers are evidently bent on spending more money and involving the city in a needless debt, whilst the taxes now are beyond endurance, and if this is done it means a great expense to the county for a new courthouse, a large sum of the taxpayers' money to be spent for a thing that can be dispensed with entirely, thereby making a little period of flush times whilst building in the city is going on. One thing the court can rely upon, viz: That if such a thing is attempted a recall petition will be at once started and carried.

Another election is approaching, and I would suggest the advisability, when nominating those who control our finances, of taking men who have substantial property interests in the county; men of mature years, who have been successful in the management of their own affairs, and not those who, like a tortoise, have all or nearly all their possessions on their back or in their belly.

I see them boosting the population of the town of Eugene and claiming 12,000 people. Now, if an honest count is made and told to the public, I predict that it will be about 8,000 people; and Portland, claiming through their papers, 250,000, will show about 140,000. What is the use of so much lying to boost and boom these towns? If this thing continues property will be valueless; the taxes and necessary expenses of maintenance will eat up all the profits. I have seen this thing before, and conservative, thinking men should put a stop to the present reckless course that is being pursued; and in making nominations for the legislature men who have been there and have tried to put on the taxpayers numerable jobs should be left at home. I refer particularly to those in this county who tried to put the commissioners on a salary of \$1,000 a year each.

It seems that the city boomers, with the county court, think that the producing element of the county exists solely for the purpose of being milked for their benefit.
