PURCHASE LARGE TRACT.

Cottage Grove Man Refuses \$30,000 for Land in Douglas County.

Messrs. J. S. Milne of this city and Oscar Snelson of Billingham, Washington, have purchased 1000 acres of fruit land thirty miles south of Cottage Grove, 700 acres of the tract being under cultivation. Besides this, they have options on 3000 acres adjoining, and it is their purpose to dispose of the entire tract to some large company which is desirous of engaging extensively in fruit raising. The Churchill-Matthews Company of Portland has looked over the property with a view to buying it, and others are considering it. Mr. Milne on Saturday refused an offer of \$30,000 for the 1000 acres held by him and Mr. Snelson. The tract is on the railroad and main wagon road and is considered a good proposition.

Mr. Snelson will take up his residence in Cottage Grove in the near future, and will probably be instrumental in locating others here. He is a man of considerable means.

HOMESEKERS' LOW RATES.

Railroads Will Bring Many From East Beginning April 1.

Another compromise has been made by the railroads in granting westbound homeseekers' rates for the spring tourist season of 1910. The season this spring will be 45 days in length as against 30 last fall and 60 last spring. The compromise is the result of the innumerable struggle that is going on among the northern and central roads embraced in the Trans-continental Passenger Association, which establishes these rates semi-annually.

The chief importance of the present announcement of rates is that every one of the commercial organizations in the Pacific Northwest will get out hundreds of thousands of pamphlets, in-sets and other forms of literature advertising the new rates so that it might be said that the grand publicity and exaltation campaign for 1910 is under way.

Hotel Man Goes to Springfield. Monday the Theatre Cafe which has been owned and run by Mr. and Mrs. L. Jacobs for the past several months changed hands. The new proprietors are Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Mooney who came here from Cottage Grove and took possession Monday morning. ness at Cottage Grove. He comes highly recommended from Cottage Grove as being a first-class hotel and restaurant man. He is contemplating making some changes in the interior of the restaurant room which will add to the convenience as well as the appearance of the interior.—Springfield News.

THE ROYAL HIGHLANDERS.

Castle Will Be Organized in Cottage Grove Within a Fortnight.

Within the ensuing fortnight District Deputy Wallace will organize a castle of Royal Highlanders in Cottage Grove, when he will go to Lorane and Comstock. He recently instituted a castle at Dorena, at the head of which is Mr. J. C. Howard, whose enthusiasm in the fraternal and benevolent feature insures a strong castle at that place.

The ritualistic degree work of the Royal Highlanders is said to be beautiful and instructive, it having been based upon some events in old Scottish history. This society is a secret fraternal insurance organization. It is formed for the purpose of combining its membership into local and executive bodies for social, educational and financial benefits, upon a sound, safe and equitable basis. Both sexes are admitted to beneficial membership upon equal terms. The plan of insurance provides benefits for its certificate holders in case of old age or death. After the age of 70 years has been attained, one-tenth of the certificate will be paid annually until the full amount of the certificate had been paid. In case of death before the full amount has been paid the balance will be paid to the beneficiary named in the certificate, at a single payment.

School Examination.

Questions for the state and county school examinations have just been sent out from the office of the State Superintendent of Schools. The examinations will commence Wednesday morning February 9, and on that day the applicants will be examined in penmanship, history, spelling, physical geography, reading and psychology. Thursday the applicants will write on written arithmetic, theory of teaching, grammar, bookkeeping, physics and civil government. Friday will be devoted to physiology, geography, composition, algebra, English Literature, and school law. The examinations will close Saturday with a test in botany, plane geometry and general history. There are approximately 200 applicants for the state examinations.
